The Angel Gabriel is by Sally Scott, a renowned artist, glass engraver and printmaker. The original depicted the Angel visiting Mary, is part of a huge glass screen Sally engraved at the Roman Catholic Shrine to Our Lady at Walsingham in 2010. The full size copy, as a freestanding banner, will hang in the Chancel at Hanslope.

In 1999 Sally produced the beautiful glass doors into St James Church at Hanslope. In the past 60 years Sally's work has helped shape the face of modern British ecclesiastical architecture. Pieces can be seen in churches and cathedrals throughout the UK including Westminster Abbey.

Fr Robert Nokes left this earthly life on 26th November 2021. Over his 58 years of ministry, he wrote countless carefully crafted sermons. Every Friday was spent writing, in later life painfully using a lap top (he was no typist) or revising earlier work. All were annotated with date, place, occasion. Saturday evenings meant reading through and double checking. He was a demanding preacher. Every word mattered; you missed a word or sentence at your peril.

The original of this sermon was first preached at two Eucharists on Advent Sunday, 2nd December 1990 – at Furneux Pelham and then at Braughing, Hertfordshire. He delivered this revision at Castlethorpe and then Hanslope on 18th November 2018.

A Sermon for Advent – 2nd December 1990

Then they will see the son of Man, coming in a cloud with great power and glory.” St Luke 21 (27) and Mark 13:26

The word Advent means ‘coming’, ‘Christ is coming.’

A huge amount of Jesus’ own teaching in the Gospels and of the teaching of the Epistles and Revelation looks forward to his final Coming at the end of time. Over and over again in his parables he described his Kingdom as a process that goes on quietly under the surface all the time, but which will finally breakthrough in reality for all to see.

Now we’ve got to be honest. Christians are deeply divided about how to interpret all this. Does it mean that he will one day return to *this world*, and set up his Kingdom here? Or is his kingdom something beyond this world – and even beyond heaven? He himself said, ‘*Heaven and earth will pass away*,’ and the Revelation describes him as bringing the saints from heaven with him, and establishing a new heaven and a new earth.

You might think that the question of whether his kingdom will be in *this world*, or utterly *beyond* this world, was an absolutely crucial. But, oddly enough, in practice, it isn’t. Because, in practice, the steps

we should take in *this* life, to prepare for it, are exactly the same, whichever it is.

What then does our Lord's own teaching, and the teaching of the rest of the New Testament, tell us?

Three things at least:

First, that when his kingdom does come it will come suddenly. Even if his kingdom is to come in *this* world, it won't be a matter of steady and gradual advance. Christians have been praying, '*Thy Kingdom come; Thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven*' for nearly 2,000 years – and we sometimes get depressed that progress, if any, is so slow.

We're right to get depressed – we should grieve over the vast amount of suffering and injustice that there are still in the world. That grief should spur us to new action.

But this doesn't mean God's forgotten us. Both our Lord's own teaching and the Revelation tell us that, despite our best endeavours, conflict and suffering will, in practice, get to their worst just before the final breakthrough; and that if we think there's peace, it will be a fake peace. We should see '*Wars and rumours of Wars*' as a warning that it might come soon. Christ's own teaching, and St Paul's, are equally clear – that we can never say with certainty *when*.

Secondly, Christ will come as Judge. And by what standard will he just us? By nothing less than the standard of his own perfection, a standard by which we've all failed.

If that sounds terrifying, as in one sense it should, we must remember that the whole purpose of his first Coming was to bring redemption and forgiveness. If we put no faith at all in our own puny achievements, if we put all our faith and trust in his mercy, then the Good News is that we shall be accepted, despite everything, just like the penitent thief, for example, was accepted on the Cross. That's the heart of the Christian message.

But what about those people who've never heard Christ's message, or never had a fair chance to respond to it? St John says that God's revelation of himself, his '*word*' which finally becomes incarnate in Jesus, is also '*the light that enlightens every man*'. Everyone who's ever lived has had some inkling of God's will for us. If that seems vague, our Lord himself gives us a very big clue in the parable of the sheep and the goats, when he says that people will be judged far more by the acts of kindness they have, or haven't done, to others, than by anything else.

So, **first** – Christ's coming will be sudden; **secondly** – he'll come as Judge; and **thirdly** – when his kingdom is established, it will be a community in which people really do accept him as their king, and love one another in his power, and as he wants.

So, we must go on, in *this* life, asking the Holy Spirit to transform us more and more deeply into the loving people he wants us to be. It will be no good on Judgement Day throwing ourselves on Christ's mercy if, in our heart of hearts, we don't want to live in a society of perfect love anyway.

In the very last resort, even on Judgement Day, Christ will never force his will on us. But, in that case, there will be no future purpose for us: that's the end. The Hebrew word for Hell is *Gehenna*. *Gahenna* actually exists in this world. It's the place outside Jerusalem where they burnt all the rubbish. The idea of hell-fire isn't everlasting revenge, but it is finality!

That, ultimately, is the choice we must make. Do we want the Holy Spirit to transform us into people who love each other with Christ-like love, and who will one day be able to live in a genuinely perfect society – or, is that asking more than we want to give? That should be the theme of our Advent thoughts.


The best way to prepare ourselves worthily to re-live Christ's first Coming at Christmas is to prepare for his final Coming – whenever it may happen.



Remembrance Weekend - Hanslope

On Saturday 8th we held a concert for HO and the Royal British Legion in St James church with wonderful musicians and readers. We were extremely grateful to Adrian Boynton, Director of Music at Christ the Cornerstone in Milton Keynes, who stepped in to accompany singers and trumpeter after Justin Lavender had to retire due to ill health.

We were joined by MP Chris Curtis, City Cllr Alison Andrew, Cllr Dorothy Courtman and Stephen Tunney, Hanslope Royal British Legion.

There were great performances from the evening's scratch choir dubbed the HO Chorus; soloists Tony Kempster, John MacDomnic – Trumpet, Wesley Biggs and Gayathrie Patrick. Readers were Sarah Murfin, Sandy White, Janet Shipton, John Sorrell, Glenn Shipton, Stuart Macfarlan, Gillian Glanville and Millie Latraille.

There was a great range of music from Faure's Requiem to Harry James' jazz interspersed with moving (and funny) readings; culminating in the Last Post and falling poppy petals. Our enormous thanks to everyone. We raised £557.20 ie £278.60 each to HO and the RBL.

Sunday's Remembrance Day Service began with the Act of Remembrance and laying of wreaths before the Altar in the Soldier's Chapel, Hanslope's War Memorial by representatives of the City and Parish Council, Royal British Legion, Hanslope World War One Committee and St James Sunday School. The Last Post was played by Helen Pakes (trumpet) and Jacob Glanville (euphonium).

On Tuesday, 11th November the Armistice Day Act of Remembrance took place on The Green in front of the cherry tree planted in 2016 to commemorate those killed in both wars. Wreaths were again laid by our local representatives; and movingly, poppies planted by children from Hanslope Pre School who joined in the occasion.

Castlethorpe Remembrance Service

The congregation were greeted by a bright sunny November morning as they gathered around the village Memorial in North Street. This year's service was initiated by a march from the Village Hall with the Beaver and Cub Scouts, village dignitaries, local

councillors, PCO and the Vicar. The service commenced prompt at 9.15am with Fr Gary opening the service with a




prayer followed by him reading the persons who gave their lives. The dignitaries in turn laid their wreaths at the memorial including a Beaver and Cub Scout. The traditional two

supporting prayer. The congregation were then included in a communal prayer and concluded the service with The Lord's Prayer.

Top tips for a greener Christmas from A Rocha's Eco Church

Programme:

How can we be better at caring for creation and each other through healthy, eco-friendly and sustainable choices at Christmas? The ideas below could make a world of difference, and a difference to the world. Take time to pray, reflect, and consider acting on one or two, or however many you like! You may find the change is for life and not just for Christmas.

- 1)** Start with your Advent calendar. Support overseas farmers by ensuring that your calendar, and any Christmas chocolate is Fairtrade. You'll be helping those farmers to make a decent living, and encouraging them to farm in a more ecologically sustainable way with every bite.
- 2)** Rent a tree. Did you know that, in the UK, 6 – 8 million real Christmas trees go to landfill every year? With a Christmas tree rental scheme you can enjoy a real tree knowing it will be replanted later.
- 3)** Re-use cards and wrapping. Help reduce the huge amount of trees that go into making Christmas tags by re-using old Christmas cards. Recycle the section that carries the greeting, cut out the picture and use that as a tag. You could use fabric remnants and ribbons to make simple, drawstring gift bags in various sizes. Use these for your family and close friends and they could be reused for years to come. Recycled brown paper has a much lower ecological footprint than Christmas wrapping paper. Young children might enjoy decorating it and buy you five minutes to get all those other Christmas jobs done!
- 4)** Create homemade gifts. Baked goods for example, or buy gifts from a charity shop – you'll be amazed at what can be found. You could buy an attractive glass or vase and fill it with chocolates or flowers. Kilner jars, and other glass jars, filled with small items also make attractive gifts.

5) Give the gift of time. Too many unwanted gifts end up in landfill. What about a gift of cooking for someone once a month for a year, taking them for a coffee, babysitting, house cleaning, or whatever. Just make a 'gift of time gift voucher' and put it in a card for them.

6) Dim the lights but not the joy! LED Christmas lights help to save energy and money. You could make your table festive with some candles, scented ones perhaps. Use eco-friendly candles made from beeswax, soy or other vegetable alternatives. And empty jars with some ribbon make beautiful DIY candleholders.

7) Remember the reason for the season. Practising generosity and hospitality is a great way to show Christ's love at Christmas. Invite someone who'd otherwise be on their own, to join you on Christmas Day. It's also a way of reducing energy consumption as they'll share your heating and cooking!

8) Recycle right. More waste ends up in landfill over Christmas than during the rest of the year, so it's a great time to review your recycling set up. Different local authorities offer different recycling provisions, so find out exactly what you can recycle at home. Don't forget – most wrapping paper is not recyclable. You can test it by doing the 'scrunch' test. If it springs back, it isn't recyclable. And always remove the Sellotape before recycling.

The end result was that we were joined by a merry band of about 14 volunteers, who clipped, trimmed, strimmed, removed ivy, cleaned pathways and gullies! Thank you to everyone (on both sides of the counter) who supported us.

The event was the first of its kind for the organisers: its aim is to identify ways of improving young children’s experiences in church and how we might grow our younger congregational numbers. Workshops included Building a Bridge Between School and Church, which I found very useful, Sacramental Teaching to the under 5’s and Teaching Older Children. There were around 40 delegates with a sprinkling of clergy, including the lovely Bishop Will Hazelwood who preached on Sunday morning. I came away with two very positive thoughts firstly, that we’re actually doing a lot of good stuff already, and secondly, there’s scope to do lots more and to be bold in our quest to improve those relationships we have and are yet to have. I am very excited for the times ahead of us.

Nick Fearn also reflects on the Conference:

This was our first proper visit to Walsingham; it won't be our last and it didn't disappoint. I'm so glad that I could share the experience with my wife Jenny, and with good friends. We joined about 40 delegates from across the country all telling a similar story. Concerns of little or no participation at services from the Gen Z and A community and a common theme of a lack of volunteers.

Despite these concerns, the conference was buoyant. Excellent speakers gave fresh insights into what we could look to do and what we hadn't considered. While there were things we won't be implementing in the Benefice, opinions and ideas were shared freely. We've brought away some great ideas and a renewed energy to do more!

We also saw that we're in a fortunate position. We're relatively small parishes, both with thriving Sunday Schools. Not many churches can boast that and I think those who've led and nurtured Sunday School can be very proud of their achievements.

Away from the conference, we were able to attend services across the two days, Rite of Sprinkling at the Holy Well and managed to frequent the local winery for a debrief!!! The highlight for me was saying the Rosary in the Holy House just after Compline. I was alone and it was a privilege to be able to be able to do this in such a holy place. Our final act of worship on Sunday evoked memories of my first and only pilgrimage, which was to Lourdes in 1986. I felt the same emotion at the end of Mass in Walsingham, that I did in Lourdes.

A visit also wouldn't have been complete without a visit to the Shrine Gift Shop to hammer the credit card!
